BEHIND THE BRICKS & MORTARS

ANAWIM HOUSING DEVELOPS STABLE HOMES AND STRENGTHENS COMMUNITIES. OUR MISSION IS PURPOSELY VAGUE WHEN IT COMES TO HOW WE DEFINE DEVELOPMENT. FOR MANY, DEVELOPMENT MEANS A BUILDING – NEW CONSTRUCTION, REHABILITATION OR REPURPOSING A STRUCTURE. THAT IS AND REMAINS A BIG PART OF ANAWIM HOUSING. HOWEVER WHAT MANY PEOPLE MAY NOT KNOW IS THAT OUR WORK ALSO INCLUDES A VAST NETWORK OF RESOURCES, SERVICES AND HOUSING SOLUTIONS FOR FAMILIES EXPERIENCING A HOUSING CRISIS.

FOR NEARLY TWENTY YEARS ANAWIM HOUSING HAS BEEN OFFERING PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROGRAMS THAT TARGET FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE HOMELESS. THESE PROGRAMS, NOW SERVING ALMOST 200 HOUSEHOLDS, PROVIDE A UNIQUE SOLUTION. USING OUR FUNDING COLLABORATION WITH THE CITY OF DES MOINES, THE POLK COUNTY CONTINUUM OF CARE, THE STATE OF IOWA AND THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT, ANAWIM IS ABLE TO OFFER RENT SUPPORT, CASE MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE REFERRAL TO THESE FAMILIES IN NEED OF A HOME.

WHAT MAKES THE PROGRAM ESPECIALLY EFFECTIVE IS THE COLLABORATION THAT ANAWIM HAS CREATED WITH A NETWORK OF PROPERTY OWNERS THROUGHOUT THE DES MOINES METRO. USING THIS MODEL, ANAWIM IS ABLE TO SUBLEASE UNITS TO FAMILIES GIVING THEM A SAFE PLACE TO CALL HOME AND PROVIDING THEM WITH THE DIGNITY OF HOUSING THAT IS NOT SPECIFIC TO A HOMELESS POPULATION. THIS SCATTERED SITE APPROACH BETTER INTEGRATES FAMILIES AS WELL AS OFFERING A WIDER CHOICE IN HOUSING OPTIONS.

BORROWING FROM THE QUOTE "IF YOU BUILD IT THEY WILL COME" WE SEE THE EVIDENCE EVERYDAY THAT PROVES "IF YOU GIVE THEM A HOME THEY WILL ACHIEVE." TAKE AWAY THE BURDEN OF SHELTER AND PEOPLE CAN AND WILL THRIVE. FOR MOST, NOT LONG AFTER OVERCOMING HOMELESSNESS THEIR PHYSICAL AND MENTAL HEALTH IMPROVES, THEIR OUTLOOK IMPROVES AND OPPORTUNITIES COME MORE READILY INCLUDING EDUCATION AND EMPLOYMENT. YOU WILL STILL ALWAYS HEAR ABOUT ANAWIM HOUSING'S WORK IN BUILDING HOUSES BUT ALSO KEEP LOOKING FOR US TO CONTINUE TO CREATE HOMES.





Former Anawim Tenant Receives Special Honor

Being a part of the community has truly helped me become who I am today,"

Charity, a former Anawim Housing tenant, was nominated by Anawim staff for the Opening Doors

ceremony benefitting the R. Dean Wright Housing Fund. Opening Doors is an annual celebration sharing stories of those coming from homelessness to HOPE. It recognizes individuals who have overcome challenges on their way to economic stability, and this past fall Charity was presented the Family Award.



Prior to housing with

Anawim in 2008, Charity was homeless—facing mental illness as well as substance abuse. Her mother had custody of her son. She was referred to Anawim's permanent supportive housing program, known as Shelter Plus Care. After being in housing for approximately one year, Charity regained custody of her son, Caleb. While in housing, Charity enrolled at DMACC and sought treatment to stabilize her mental health. She is a first generation college student. In 2015, Charity left Anawim Housing to move into her new home where she is able to pay full rent.

"I was petrified starting school because I hadn't been to school in 20 years. I was lacking confidence. Once I got in the swing of things though, I realized how smart I was. It helped that I had my support system: Anawim, my family

> and a few close friends. It wasn't always easy though," said Charity.

Charity is cross-enrolling at Grand View University to study social work this year. She is emerging as a leader and taking on new rolls in the community. She is president of the Human Service Club, a member of the Student Activity Council and is a member of Trio/Student Support

Services. She organizes collections for IHYC and JOPPA


Outreach. Charity's dream is to one day open a homeless
shelter for families that also provides mental health services.

"I want others to know Anawim was able to help me to become self-sufficient by giving me the tools I needed to succeed; I just had to put the tools to use. Going back to school and being a part of the community has truly helped me become who I am today," Charity said.

illiam would get particularly nervous sleeping in dumpsters because he would worry that in the morning, the dump truck would come and he'd still be in there. He would often sleep behind gas stations. On one occasion, the owner of a Quick Trip asked him to leave because they were worried about his safety sleeping out there.

These days, William finds life to be drastically different. With a roof over his head, he says he doesn't worry about getting rained on, snowed on, or having high winds blow on him anymore. When he was on the streets, even in the summer months when it was 90 degrees, he would walk outside with his winter coat on because he is anemic. He now receives regular treatments at the hospital for his anemia. When asked how he got through it he says, "Each and every day, I have to turn it over to God—I can't do this on my own."

Dan McBee, program manager with Homeless to Housing, asked William what his vision was for a happy life.



To me, just having you there (Dan), the Church, and my family. That makes a happy life for me.



William hopes to reconnect more with his family now that he has a roof over his head, and says he can now focus on making their happiness his happiness.

Out of habit, whenever William finds he has extra canned or packaged food, he will put it in a bag and give to those who may need it. His good natured heart and willingness to help people goes far from unnoticed when you meet him. He hopes to volunteer with Meals From The Heartland or another organization where he can help ensure others have access to food and get enough to eat.

Since entering into the Homeless to Housing program, William has settled into his new apartment. Outreach organizations, and our Homeless to Housing program help ensure William has access to food, various home appliances, furniture and clothing. William's apartment was noticeably clean. "I'm a bit of a neat freak," he says with a laugh. "I don't know what I can say to say thank you enough. I am so blessed."

HOMELESS TO HOUSING

In December of 2015, Anawim Housing piloted a permanent supportive housing program known as Homeless to Housing. The intent of this program, funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), is to shelter individuals who are considered to be chronically homeless, and are most vulnerable and at risk. The program allows for 18 chronically homeless individuals to be housed. These are individuals who no longer have to endure the cold nights of an Iowa winter outdoors, and whom now have a

Mental health challenges, combined with alcohol or other drug abuse problems, are often found with the people being served, as many have had a difficult time accessing supportive services in the past. Centralized Intake at Primary Health Care identifies the most vulnerable of Polk County's homeless population and refers them to Anawim Housing.

Anawim's role is to then bring them into permanent supportive housing and provide case management through our Homeless to Housing program.

Dan McBee, program manager for Anawim Housing, works with participants at their own pace, providing case management—using principles of trauma informed care, harm-reduction, motivational interviewing and strength based contact. Provided case management can include scheduling medical appointments, setting up legal appointments, helping them reconnect with family, and being a person they can trust and talk to. "There's an expectation that people will backslide, but that's okay. Being able to build a trusting relationship with participants is really what makes this program work." Dan states

The heart of the Homeless to Housing program is in the belief that housing is a fundamental human right and that housing, in and of itself, is therapeutic. Having a home is the first step to finding stability. Whatever their idea of a happy life might be, whether it's being mentally healthy, physically healthy, or having healthy relationships, Anawim will work to help them get there. Housing is the first step.

Anawim Housing Awarded Major Tax Credit Funding

On March 9, The Iowa Finance Authority awarded federal affordable housing tax credits to 11 rental projects in Iowa, including three in Greater Des Moines. Anawim Housing was awarded \$4,562,960 in tax credits for The Brickstones at Riverbend project, a 30-unit development for seniors ages 55 and older located at 513 Forest Avenue in Des Moines. The Brickstones at Riverbend will be a mixed-income, urban-style, multi-family building. The project will break ground in the fall with an anticipated completion in summer of 2017.

Anawim is also a consultant on two other awarded projects in Iowa:
The Villas at Meadow Springs in Ankeny, and Paragon Square in
Dubuque. Both projects are projected to be completed in 2017.

These awards will allow Anawim to continue moving forward with the vision that every person has a home that supports self-sufficiency.
